Students learning a foreign language for special purposes (English, respectively) need to be able not only to cope with technical specialized texts, but also to manage to have a conversation, either in their future career or in a personal interest. The article analyzes the main characteristics of an informative text and, also, the best conditions in which specialized texts are to be used in order to provide the students with the necessary practice of skills, like reading comprehension, writing, listening and speaking. ❖ Mādālina CERBAN, University of Craiova, Faculty of Letters Syntactic Dependencies within Relational Framework

The present paper discusses the dependencies of two or more elements in syntactic structures, pointing out the selectional restrictions that can appear between the dominant element and its dependents. There are three general types of dependencies: bilateral, unilateral and coordinate, and our attention is focused on the first one. In a bilateral dependence, neither the Head, nor the dependents can occur without the others. Examples of bilateral dependencies include clause, Prepositional Phrases and possessive-phrase constructions. An important concept in analyzing the dependencies is the valency which refers to the number of dependents a Head can take. Another important aspect is represented by coding properties that may serve a particular grammatical relation. Dependency relations can be expressed both by morphological means, such as verb agreement and case marking, as well as by syntactic means, such as the functions an argument can perform in a sentence according to its place in the sentence.

❖ Iulia Cristina FRÎNCULESCU, University of Medicine and Pharmacy "Victor Babeş", Timişoara The Romanian Medical Terminology of English Influence – Contemporary Dilemmas

This article presents the results of my PhD thesis on the aspects of the Romanian medical terminology after 1990, with special reference to the English influence. This thesis is quite singular at present in the Romanian linguistic field, as it analyses the medical terminology, little or not at all studied, especially in the last two decades. The PhD paper outlined in this article focuses mainly on the cross-linguistic influence of English on Romanian, at the lexico-semantic level, and highlights both the positive aspects of language contact, such as the coining of new terms, and the negative effects, namely the occurrence of

ambiguities, improper structures or even errors, the latter being the result of the interference processes between English and Romanian. The PhD study also surveys specialized translation, as it uses translations of medical literature, and my own translations of terms, phrases and medical texts, suggested throughout the analysis.

❖ Lavdosh MALAJ, University of Vlora, Faculty of Humanities, Department of Foreign Language The Summery Strategies in Text Composition and Foreign Language Learning

One of the major problems faced by non-native speakers of English is that when they go to university, they find themselves without sufficient skills to summarize textual material.

Nevertheless, the results show that high-proficiency students produce more accurate idea units and are more capable of generalizing ideas than low-proficiency students who prefer to "cut and paste" ideas. Low proficiency students are noticeably unable to exploit pre-summarizing cognitive strategies such as discriminating, selecting, note-making, grouping, inferring meanings of new words and using synonyms to convey the intended meanings.

During the reading process students can become more aware by monitoring their level of understanding of the text by using, for example, the strategy suggested by Schraw (1998) of "stop, read and think". We need to take Sewlall's (2000: 170) advice that there should be "a paradigm shift in the learning philosophy from content-based to an emphasis on the acquisition of skills".

The article is concerned with the correlation between the stylistic register and the case forms of personal pronouns in contemporary English. The focus is on the degree of interchangeability between Nominative and Accusative forms of English personal pronouns in contemporary spoken and written English. A special attention is paid to the diachronic factors which have influenced the direction of evolution of English personal pronouns both formally and pragmatically. A series of highly frequent syntactic structures in English are analysed in point of the choice of pronominal case forms according to the focus in communication, at the same time providing the Romanian equivalent structures in order to emphasize the (dis)similarities.

❖ Georgiana REISS, University of Craiova, Faculty of Letters Lexical, Syntactic and Stylistic Characteristics of English Written Legal Language

Legal language counts among languages for specific purposes which are highly specialized, having many specific features. It may be divided into two categories: the *spoken language* used in courts and the *written language* used in case law, law reports, prescriptive legal texts. In this paper we shall focus on *English written legal language* and we shall try to point out and discuss the most important characteristics from the point of view of its *lexicon* (e.g. high frequency of archaic words, Latinisms, technical jargon; common words with different meanings in legal language; repetitions, etc.), *syntax* (e.g. sentence length; extensive use of prepositional phrases; modal auxiliaries, etc.) and *style* (impersonal and formal rendered by the impersonal "it", the passive voice, etc.). Moreover, we consider that it is necessary for Romanian translators to be familiar with all these peculiarities of English legal language in order to decipher it properly and to produce good, functional translations.

❖ Alina RESCEANU, University of Craiova Issues in the syntax and semantics of Amount Relative Constructions

The aim of this paper is to present some aspects pertaining to the interpretation of a special kind of relative clause construction, which is distinguished from restrictive relative clauses and appositives, namely degree relatives. Degree or amount relatives show restriction in the relativizers they allow, in the determiners that can combine with them and in their stacking possibilities. We start by presenting Carlson's (1977) amount interpretation, continue with Heim's (1987) degrees, Grosu and Landman's (1998) maximalizing relatives and draw some conclusions regarding the possibility of a unified approach.

This article attempts to describe some translation theories which can be used when working with legal documents. The principle of legal equivalence is very important in the translation of Community law, because the same legal effect from the target text can be preserved in the source text. The aim of this paper is to investigate the potential difficulties which may arise when translating legislative texts between English and Romanian and to identify which translation theories are applied in these cases. The translation of legal documents involves more than linguistic knowledge of specialized vocabulary. A legal translator has to adapt the content of the source text to that of the target text and to preserve the same structure of the original documents. An important attention should also be paid to the cultural aspects regarding the legal systems of those countries and the system bound concepts.

Roxana ZAMFIRA, University of Craiova, Department of Applied Foreign Languages Features of Presuppositions, Inferences and Implicatures in Magazine Advertisements

The use of presuppositions, a term used in both semantics and pragmatics, allows copywriters not to make everything explicit in ads by relying on receivers to recover meaning. Implicatures and inferences are analyzed as originating with speakers and listeners respectively in the process of conveying and deciphering meaning in advertisements. In the case of ads, where paralanguage is involved, we deal with pragmatic presuppositions; the context of ads makes of them instances of particularized conversational implicatures; there is a relationship between inference and Relevance Theory, as inference accounts for the effort that the hearer needs to make in order to reverse the apparent lack of cognitive effects triggered by the producing of utterances in ads containing rhetorical figures.
